

MTA Subway


Houston Street – 1

West 4th Street – Washington Square – A,B,C,D,E,F,M

Coming from NJ Path: We are conveniently located 7 minutes away (0.4 miles) from the Christopher street station.

NJ Transit Bus: If you are coming from NJ to NY Port Authority Bus Terminal, you can take the Subway Line 1 to Hudson Street station.

If you are coming by train to Penn Station, you can take Subway Line 1 to Hudson street stations. Average time is 11 minutes.

Biking

Citi Bike

Multiple Citi Bike stations are located 1-2 blocks away from the office which makes it a great way to get to work if you reside in Manhattan.


You can rent a bike via Citi Bike or Lyft apps.


Icon Parking Systems (covered) is located directly beneath the 375 Hudson office (Between Greenwich Street and Hudson Street)







How To Print – Cirrato Follow Print

Cirrato Follow Print sends print jobs to a cloud-based queue rather than directly to a specific printer. Users are then able to print documents from any printer by swiping their registered keycard at the printer and selecting "Pull Print," when prompted.

Cirrato Registration:

- 1. Walk up to a printer and select the Cirrato icon on the home screen.
- 2. Swipe your ID badge.
- 3. A registration page will be printed.
- 4. Go to https://printam.publicisgroupe.net/Cirrato/SelfServic.e/
- 5. Sign in using your Lion Login credentials.
- 6. Follow the instructions on the print-out to complete registration.

LionGuest is a wireless network reserved for contractors, vendors and guests. Any Groupe employee can create an account for a guest. For larger groups, Re:Sources can create special accounts with a shared password.

Only create accounts for guests that you know. You are responsible for any misconduct.

Guest accounts can last up to 90 days, but the default is one week.


Creating a Guest Wi-Fi Account:

Log into the portal (<u>http://sponsor.publicisgroupe.net</u>) with your Lion Login username and password.

Enter your guest's information in the required fields and the length of their visit, then click the Create button.

The system will display your guest's account information, including their password. You can notify them via email or by printing the information. By default, no communication is sent unless you click Notify button.

Your guest signs in with the username and password you provide. The wireless network name is LionGuest.

Maman

375 Hudson Street Website

French bakery Maman is an NYC favorite — which may just have the best chocolate chip cookies in the city — and their newest (and largest) location is another must-visit.

The business first began in SoHo back in 2014 and rapidly expanded to multiple locations in Manhattan and Brooklyn. Maman, which means mother in French, is mainly inspired by the two founding partners' childhood memories from the South of France, and the menu is largely focused on recipes they picked up from their moms.

"Maman King" opened about in January 2021 at 375 Hudson St. (on the corner of Hudson & King) and is the French cafe's largest (and most beautiful) location yet.

Designed by none other than Floratorium (see many of their other exquisite dining locations across NYC here!), the "Maman King" space transports you to a lush greenhouse garden. The floral design company said it was their biggest installation to date, and took thousands of branches, greenery and florals (plus a fantastic team) to completely transform the space. They called the inspiration "Jumanji" meets "The Secret Garden"!

The dark chocolate brownies and brioche doughnuts are scrumptious.



Think of temaki as the Japanese version of tacos. Nami Nori is a cozy West Village spot to try the innovative hand rolls, stuffed with tuna poke and crispy shallots, yellowtail and scallion or lobster tempura and yuzu aioli (the menu also offers vegan options). Limited reservations are available for dinner, but people commonly line up on Carmine Street, willing to wait for a seat. There is also a good selection of beer, cider, sake, wine and matcha.

Plant based and plant filled, JaJaJa is a boozy, aqua-hued joint that evokes a Tulum beach café. The original Lower East Side branch sports a semi-enclosed outdoor patio under a thatched roof; three other locations dot the City. Vegan nachos come smothered with mock chorizo, black beans and turmeric queso fundido; add on chunky guacamole if you like. Beet and pumpkin empanadas, coconut queso quesadillas and churritos with coconut dulce de leche are also fantastic. The extensive selection of tequila and mezcal contributes to the party scene.






